## 26TH NATIONAL REGISTRATIONS SOAR

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[^0]available in the Pennsylvania Ballroom, which will be considered for the round dancing. A third dance room on the upper level, the combined Consti-tution-Independence Rooms, has sixty percent more space than the Crystal Room at the Bellevue.

On the Concourse Floor, rooms in the Exhibit Hall are to be assigned for advanced figures, hot hash, and workshop dancing, all with more space than previously available. A large area is also available for merchandise of exhibitors nearby. The 16 th Committee is currently finalizing space assignments to assure the best of dancing and a truly enjoyable convention for all.

Convention room rates at $\$ 30$ twin or double and \$26 single, including free guest parking at the garage across JFK Boulevard, will represent a savings as well as a convenience for dancers.

Five restaurants and lounges in the hotel offer everything from a quick
snack to a leisurely feast. The downtown location provides easy access to outside restaurants and shopping, with ample nearby parking, expressways, and subways for the commuting dancer. With the increased space available for dancing, consideration is being given to raising the cutoff point for registrations as high as 2000, so as to accommodate those who have in the past missed attending this event. The 1600 or so who had already been registered for the ill-fated 15th have been registered automatically for the 16 th, but it is advisable that any others who wish to share in the festivities register at once. ## A SQUARE DANCER SERMONETTE

At a recent Pocono Weekend sponsored by the Buckaroos at White Beauty View Resort, a group of dancers gathered in the ballroom overlooking beautiful Lake Wallenpaupack for a brief Sunday morning worship service. In response to several requests, the sermonette given at that service is printed here in its entirety. It is hoped that our square dancing friends of other faiths will make appropriate substitutions in the text, for the thought applies equally to everyone.

An English writer named Vance Packard has said that "For the majority of American Christians . . . going to church is the nice thing that proper people do on Sunday. It advertises their respectability, gives them a warm feeling that thev are behaving in a way their God-fearing ancestors would approve, and adds (they hope) a few cubits to their social stature by throwing them
with a social group with which they wish to be identified". That may be a little cynical, but to a certain extent it does seem to strike home. Of course, the fact that we are here right now indicates that we believe in the church as an establishment, and feel the need for gathering together to worship. In a setting such as this, one would be insensitive indeed not to experience a desire to express an appreciation of the world around him and the friendship of his associates.

That writer's analysis of the church goer has a parallel in the world of square dancing, where going to a dance is the fun thing for people to do, advertising their ability to achieve certain levels of accomplishment, and giving them a warm feeling that they "belong". But as that writer implied, being seen with the "right people" isn't enough. Re-

sponding to the community urge for good will by going to church at Christmas, and the urge for renewal at Easter, does not constitute being a good Christian, any more than paying admission and attending a dance makes one a total and complete square dancer.
"Involvement" is the key word here. We have a tendency to think that if our private life is good and clean, with no unkind thoughts or overt actions against others, we are living a Christian life. But no one can be totally Christian in private, for Christianity is a movement and it involves people working together in relationships both private and public. That which a person does for the good of someone else, some public service, or some private charity that is over and above the requirements of social decency - it is such an undertaking that incorporates a person into the fullness of the Christian life and service.

Do these thoughts suggest to you
parallel principles in the world of square dancing? Certainly we all realize that we must act in concert with others in order to get through a tip, but do we really cooperate? Do we inconspicuously help each other through a difficult figure, or, in our superior manner, do we just put-up with others' shortcomings, letting them know meanwhile that they are inept? Do we volunteer for the various duties necessary to make a dance or convention a success, or must we be drafted - or worse, do we refuse outright? Do we welcome each couple to our club or square, or are we "loners" who, perhaps unintentionally, challenge the world to enterain us.

Yes, this is all a part of being a good Christian, not just in our private lives but in our daily contacts with others, not just in our work-a-day world but in our recreational world, too. Let's really sell our Christian beliefs by living them openly.
