## SEWING INFORMATION by Lillian Sutton

Cording is a decorative trim that you can use to produce a professional finish to the garments you make. It is easy to do and about the only investment required is your time. Cording can be used in any seam, but is most often seen at the edges of necklines, armholes, collars, cuffs and yolks and in waistline seams. On square dance dresses it is also effectively used in the seam joining a flounce to the skirt, around a midriff and between the gores or tiers of the skirt. It is especially nice in the waistline seam as it produces a finished look and eliminates the need for a belt, which tends to be hot. For the cording you can use self fabric, a contrasting color or print, or bias tape for your cording depending upon the design of your dress. To make cording, cut strips of true bias wide enough to cover your filler plus seam allowances. Since $5 / 8^{\prime \prime}$ seam is the standard for most patterns it will be easier to insert in your construction seam if you allow this on your cording, so your strips will probably be $13 / 8$ or $1 \frac{1}{2}$ inches wide. You can use purchased cable cord, string, or yarn as the filler, but be sure to shrink it first. To make the cording, fold the bias over your filler and stitch close to the cord. Use the cording (zipper) foot on your sewing machine, stretching the bias slightly as you sew, being careful not to stitch into the filler. Sew the cording to the right side of the seam you are finishing so that you can see that it is stitched accurately. Then permanently join the seams by stitching on the wrong side along the original cord stitching line. At the end of the seam, pull the filler out $5 /{ }^{\prime \prime}$ " and cut it off to reduce bulk in the seam where two pieces are joined as at the center back of waistline and neckline edge, etc. If the seam you are cording is almost straight, as a waistline seam, you might be able to use a straight strip for your cording, but bias will lie much smoother.

Bias tubing is another versatile trimming that you can make. Depending upon the way it will be used, the bias tubing may be pressed flat or used as a roll; the type of fabric often controls the width it will be made and how it will be used.

Sometimes the seam is trimmed close to the seamline for a soft pliable tube or the seam may be made several times as wide as the finished bias to form a firm tubing. Cable cord or yarn can be inserted into the finished tubing to make a hard tube which can be made into belts. Always use true bias, otherwise it will twist and pull and be difficult to use. Use a short stitch on the machine and hold the bias firm when stitching. After stitching, turn it with a bodkin or bobby pin.

When pressed flat, the tubing can be used to outline a midriff, edge a collar or neckline, make decorative bows or cover the waistline seam. Tack it by hand to the garment from the underside. When a hard tubing is made, it can be used for straps, twisted, braided, tied into knots at intervals, or formed into scrolls to add a decorative detail to a dress. Here's where you can play around with the tubing until you find the right detail for your dress.

I like to tack flat tubing at the waistline seam as it gives the appearance of a belt, but is more comfortable than a belt for dancing. Make the finished tubing about $1 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ wide. Trim the seam and press it open over a dowel and after turning, press the tubing flat with the seam in the center of the underside. Tack it to the waistline seam and finish with a flat bow at the center back.

To make a flat bow - make tubing the desired width and press flat with seam in center of the underside. Cut a piece of tubing twice the length of the finished bow. Mark the center and fold raw edges to that center line and stitch flat. To create the knot, cut a strip of tubing long enough to go around the bow, plus a seam allowance. Wrap it around the bow at the center. On the underside, lap one end over the other pulling tight to create the bow effect and skipstitch in place. Tack the knot invisibly to the bow.

These basic techniques will help you in making bows from ribbon, braid, lace or tubing to use in decorating a dress.

## WHERE DOES MY HEAD GO? <br> by Brian Bassett, RDM Publisher

We're sure you have heard many "rules" as to which way you should turn your head while executing certain round dance figures. So many, in fact, that we know you will enjoy being presented with a basic rule that will cover head positioning for every round dance figure you know, excluding only some of the more advanced English competitive Ballroom figures where sometimes head positioning is merely a matter of styling.

The following consideration for head positioning is purely a mechanical one. In the interest of comfortable, pleasant to watch dancing - you should always "Turn your head so that you are looking in the direction of turn in the particular step or dance figure your are executing."

If you are pivoting or turning right face you should look to your right until the head is facing in the direction it should be in when the step or figure is completed. Look to your left when turning or pivoting steps or figures have you moving left face.

NEVER look down. Looking down at your feet or even at your partner when executing turning or pivoting steps or figures is a sure way to make these same moves more difficult than they should be.

Beginning dancers often think that by watching their feet, learning dance steps is made easier. Actually, the opposite is true. No one feels the need to watch their feet as they walk...Feet can be "thought" where to go, so don't ever look at your feet while dancing or learning. That just gives the brain one more thing to
decipher, thereby slowing down the overall learning process.
