What a "Pow-Wow" they had at the Marriott! It was our 13th Convention, after two moves. We felt the quick move would create some major problems, but they were quite minor and were corrected right away, or will be by our next convention committee.

The hotel personnel was really pleasant and registration went very smoothly, with plenty of help on hand and hotel maps to help with directions to their facilities.

Dancing on rugs, sprayed with silicone, is much easier and more relaxing than we anticipated. A few of us, who have back and circulation problems, felt a big difference and actually danced more than usual.

The "Pow-Wow" was sold out and people were even turned away. This is super, but the real concern is having no room to grow, like in the younger years of the convention. Next year's committee plans
to cut back some, because of the space available. So, if you really want to attend, sign up as soon as possible! Many registrations were made during the threeday Convention for next year. There are already over 600 registered.

Another real concern, is what will happen after next year's convention, put on by our past convention's chairmen. The Convention Board has requested twice now, from each district, to obtain bids for chairman of the 26th Convention. Only one couple has bid, but the problem is, it's not their district's turn. There will probably be a 26th Convention, but how about in the future? Everyone, please keep in mind a bid for a convention chairman. We've worked on a convention which is a big help. Which also brings to mind, whoever handles the 26th Convention, if they happen to ask you for help, jump right in or even better, volunteer. True, it is a lot of work and long hours, but it's fun and oh, how many friends you find along the way.


## TIPS FOR SQUARE \& ROUND DANCING

By Peggy \& Sam Brubaker

Square and Round Dancing is a lot of fun, but why make it more difficult than it really is? I would like to share four tips which I had printed several years ago.

1) The most important one which holds true to anything we do in our lives. Listen to the caller or cuer. While they are doing this stand still, picture in your mind what they are saying, try to see an easy way of doing it, helping each other. If you break down, don't argue with your partner and other dancers - wait until after the tip and work it out if it is a new figure. Perhaps someone in the square who has been dancing longer will help you or go to the caller - he or she is always willing to help.
2) Know your basic figures well, because all of your newer figures are nothing but several basics together in most cases. Don't be ashamed to admit you don't know or don't remember.
3) Styling is knowing where you belong, which also goes to the figure knowledge. If you know where you belong the errors are very few. One thing that does help is holding hands after each figure is done. Hold hands doing figures when you are able to.
4) Dance at different clubs under different callers and cuers - not just one.

When a square breaks down it could be for many reasons. For instance, one night we were dancing and for some
reason my mind wandered, the caller called track 2 and I did a clover leaf. Fortunately I recovered fast enough that I jumped into the right space, but a lot of times this does not occur. My suggestion is calm down, square up immediately then either form a line or wait for a former call. Don't try to keep going. Say doing a figure you lose your partner for some reason and the caller has you in a square again doing the hash call (first set). Right away he calls sides go in do whatever, you want to go back to your original partner, suggestion: don't because you may break the square down or you don't have the time. You have a partner, why not stay where you are. At the break between the hash and singer, go back to your original partner if you are not already.

My husband and I have been dancing for several years, Sam 20 and myself 17, over these years we have noted many couples having a little more difficult problem. So I note their club and, if possible, names. I will go to someone (an old member) of the club or the caller or cuer to find out the situation, from there I have the understanding, meanwhile the caller or cuer is aware that other dancers are unhappy. It is up to them or the club to do something, not outsiders. All we can do is understand and try to help them on the dance floor. Suggestion to callers and cuers: if you detect this in class say within ten to fifteen lessons you try everything, then discourage them in a pleasant and gentle way. The world of square and round dancing is fun, we really don't need problems beyond our control.


## FEDERATION MEETING MINUTES

Following is a brief synopsis of the Federation of Delaware Valley Square and Round Dancers Board Meeting held on September 12, 1985, at the Marriott Hotel in Philadelphia.

Betty Wolf, Chairman of Membership, reported that the membership cards, stickers and rosters had been distributed to all three districts.

Ethel Smith, Publicity Chairman, stated that the "Where To Dance Book" had been printed and would soon be distributed at the Club level to all members.

Advisory Committee Chairman, John Lackenmayer, reported that they still did not have any names to report to chair the 26th D.V.S.\&R.D. Convention and that he would go back to the district chairman for names of a possible chairman.

Roger Owings reported that the Federation's \$1,000,000 Liability and Property Damage insurance program had been renewed for 1985-86 with 80 of the 84 clubs represented. Roger asked that all claims be brought to his attention only, so that he would be the one to call the insurance carrier.

Steve Musial from Legacy, is most interested in hearing from anyone who has some positive solutions to the national problem of the decline of square dancing. A group of people have organized and a meeting will be held on November 23, 1985, with people from all over the country, to try and come up with solutions to this problem. The Revised Constitution and By-Laws have been printed and will be distributed to all the clubs in the near future.

The 1986 Officers' Ball will be hosted by the Federation this year, but in the following years the districts will take turns hosting this dance.

All arrangements have been made for the Jim Wolf Benefit Dance to be held on November 17, 1985, at St. Matthias Church in Bala Cynwyd. It is hoped that everyone will make an effort to attend to help boost the fund to buy a van for Jim Wolf, who was paralyzed as a result of a swimming accident.
A discussion was held concerning the Statement of Policy for the Convention Advisory Committee and a committee will be formed to review this policy in detail.

The Federation Dues will be raised to $\$ 1.00$ per person beginning calendar year 1987.

Bill Manuel, President, announced that he had received a letter of resignation from Walt \& Ruth Henderson, who will be unable to chair the Wildwood Weekend. Bill said that he had asked Wil \& Lorraine Kent of Liberty Squares, Pen-Del District, to chair this weekend and that they had consented. Also asked to serve on this committee were: Ruth \& Jacque Dessinger, Phil \& Edith Brown and George \& Olive Wilcox.

The Federation is attempting to determine if a group would be interested in a "Bus Trip To The 35th National Convention" in Indianapolis, Indiana. Details of this trip will be forthcoming. If anyone is interested, they should contact Bill Manuel.

## ROUNDALAB \& U.R.D.C. CREED \& PROPOSALS

Roundalab, the International Association of Round Dance Teachers, Inc., a professional organization for round dance teachers was formed to promote, protect and perpetuate the general round dance movement as a complement to the overail square dance picture. Roundalab now has its annual meeting the Sunday, Monday and Tuesday immediately prior to, and in the same city as, the National Square Dance Convention.

The Universal Round Dance Council (URDC) is an organization composed of both round dance teachers and dancers with basically the same goals. The URDC sponsors an annual Round Dance Convention at the end of July.

Since the goals of both Roundalab and URDC are supportive of, and in harmony with each other, representatives of both organizations met in June 1985 to explore areas of mutual interest and cooperation. The following joint creed and proposals were the result.

## URDC - Roundalab Creed

We believe that the ultimate goal of an organization in round dancing is to help round dancing grow and flourish. We believe that we can promote, protect and perpetuate the activity by cooperative effort of teachers and dancers to increase the enjoyment of round dancing by all dancers from Beginners through Advanced.

## Proposals

1). To develop common standards, we recommend that Roundalab use the URDC Manual as a source for undefined terms. We also recommend that Roundalab submit copies of current definitions to URDC to study.

We suggest that the Roundalab Phase Chairmen be the Liaison to the URDC Board in the above matters.
2). We propose that Roundalab share material and ideas of our Mini-Clinics and teacher Training Curriculum with URDC.
3). We recommend that Roundalab send out press releases on the Roundalab Phase Rating System with the booklet and that these be available for the

4). We recommend that to improve the cooperative effort between Roundalab and URDC, all Roundalab members be encouraged to join URDC and vice versa for teacher members of URDC.
5). We recommend that there be another meeting similar to this one, possibly in July 1986 and again in June 1987.

All were adopted unanimously by the Roundalab membership at their annual meeting in June and by the URDC membership at their annual meeting in July.

## "ROUNDALAB PHASE RATING SYSTEM''

The purpose of a Round Dance Rating System is to provide for rating round dances according to complexity. The system should be one that can be readily used and understood by all those involved in Round Dancing.

In 1985, Roundalab adopted the "Roundalab Phase Rating System". This system identifies a dance relative to the Roundalab Phases with a plus of no more than two to indicate steps in a dance in phases beyond the Basic Rating, or unphased steps: For example: Roundalab Phase II +2 would indicate a dance including Roundalab Phase I \& II figures but with two figures in Phases above Phase II.

Since the system is simplified and leaves little room for error, the committee feels each choreographer should assume the responsibility of rating his or her own dance before publication. If however, the choreographer chooses not to rate his or her material, it can easily
be accomplished by any person using the Roundalab material.

At the recent Roundalab Convention in Alabama, more figures were placed in the Phases. The committee realizes there are still figures that have not as yet been phased, and that this will be an ongoing project. If dancers will notify the Roundalab Office (3 Churchill Road, Cresskill, NJ 07626) of figures that have not been assigned to a Phase, a compilation will be made and forwarded to the proper committee for phasing at Roundalab's next annual meeting in June 1986 in Indiana.

The 1986 Phase Rating System pamphlet - an alphabetical compilation of figures in the Six phases, enabling all interested persons to rate dances - is now available from the Roundalab Office.


## 35TH NATIONAL SQUARE DANCE CONVENTION

When the 35th Annual Square Dance Convention opens in Indianapolis, a main focus for activities launching the affair June 26, 1986, will be the awesome Hoosier Dome, 95,000 square feet of dancing space surrounded by 60,000 seats under a billowing cover of white. Here, plus dancing will inaugurate the convention from 9:00 AM to 11:00 AM on opening day.

Not that other halls in the spacious Indianapolis convention complex will be less active.

Basic dancing will begin at the same 9:00 AM starting time in Hall B, only a short stroll, under roof, from the dome floor. Hall B contains 28,500 square feet of dancing space and will also include a solo area.

The Dome and halls will continue being busily occupied until the convention closes June 28, 1986.

Other areas include: Hall A, 26,500 square feet for clogging; Hall C, 30,000 square feet for A-1 and A-2 dancing; Hall D, 26,900 square feet for plus dancing; Hall E, 26,500 square feet square feet for mainstream, and the 500 Ballroom, 13,340 square feet for intermediate rounds and the Showcase of Rounds. Smaller rooms to be used in the facility total an additional 27,848 square feet, including space for contra, youths, easy and high intermediate-advance rounds.

And still there is plenty of space for the Showciase of Ideas and exhibitors' booths.

The Hoosier Dome and Convention Center is a convenient layout with minimum use of stairs. The Convention Center halls form a shape like the letter L, with the Hoosier Dome cradled inside the letter. Entering from the top of the L, dancers encounter a wide passageway, highlighted by a broad, semi-circular stairway.

The stairs provide one of several avenues to the upper level rooms. Down the hall, the dancer comes face-to-face with Hall $B$, site of basics dancing; it is flanked by Hall A and Hall C.

A turn to the left leads to Halls D and E , scene of mainstream and plus danc-
ing. Across from these halls is one of the entrances to the Hoosier Dome floor.

The entire complex covers only about one city block.

Dancers will find Halls D and E and the Hoosier Dome nearly spanking new; the convention will come at the end of only the second full year of operation since those areas were added to the Convention Center. The exceptionally wide hallways and convenient, direct routing to the halls will make the 35th Convention a pedestrian's paradise.

Dancing in the Dome during daytime hours will present soft even illumination from daylight diffused through the fabric roof. At night, lights bathe the floor in a glow bright enough to play football as well as square through. From the outside, the lights at night set the dome aglow, announcing to the city that a major event is taking place inside.

The Dome also will be the site of exhibition groups, evening ceremonies and the Saturday fashion show and parade of states. There also will be exhibitions in other halls. The Dome and halls also will be the site of after parties.

The Dome is precisely four blocks from the very heart of Indianapolis. It is diagonally across the street from the Indianapolis Hyatt Regency, one of the city's largest hotels and is connected by a pedestrian walkway to Union Station, the city's newest motel, food and shopping complex, scheduled to open two months before the square dance convention.

The facilities can very comfortably hold the 40,000 dancers expected to attend the convention back home again in Indiana.

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## CALLERS' WORKSHOP By Lloyd \& Elleen Lockerman

In Workshop \#1 we acknowledged the Callers' challenge for a "Limited R/D Program', exposed the common ground of rounds and squares and set forth our objective to present a workable program.

Our plan simply advises that we first teach people" How To Dance" and then develop this knowledge into the "Language and Disciplines" of round and square dance basics. This applies to both round and square dance classes and implies that both should be identical in the beginning. Knowing when and how to convert into your specialty is dependent upon the class and the ability of its leader. Our presentation is designed to show how this can be done in the beginners square dance class but its application is flexible and adaptable to existing S/D clubs as well as beginners S/D classes.

Prerequisites
The most fundamental requirement is

Knowledge. The following are items that may be new to some Callers, but need not be formidable obstacles since they can easily be mastered when used in conjunction with our Round Dance Manual for Beginners.
(1) Know the elementary round dance basics and be able to cue. (2) Be able to define dancing, explain musical terms, directions and positions. (3) Understand and be able to identify Rhythm, Timing, Measures and Tempo. (4) Mechanical knowledge and dancing ability. (5) Ability to read and interpret cue sheets.

Organize An Orderly \& Logical Plan
At no time during the early learning process should the class sessions be segregated into separate round or square dance periods.
(1) Devote the beginning of every class meeting to teaching dancing without reference to round or square. (Can end as couples marching to form squares). (2) Assemble and be familiar with good reference material. (3) Prepare a teaching

order of material to be taught and a check list to measure progress. (4) Do not pattern your teaching order of basics from a dance routine. (5) Develop basics through slight variations of the rhythmic walk. (6) Pyramid this development by further varying one step of each basic to create a new basic. (Example: Change the 3rd step of a Side Two Step from side to forward and we create the box). (7) Drill dance basics constantly - Hash Cue.

Application of the Plan - First Night
(1) Form a circle, Men with their partners on their right, all facing center - turn on your charm - and explain dancing as a physical interpretation of the rhythm and beat of music. Explain the Two Step rhythm as 4 beats per measure and identify to strong music through a physical interpretation by having everyone count, clap hands and march in place. (2) Indentify directions from the circle facing center of hall using quarter right turns to line of dance, wall and reverse line of dance. Command these directions at random to
develop reaction. (3) From the circle, all holding hands, introduce the Side Two Step - Indentify as the basis of dancing upon which we build and stress the physical interpretation in detail to develop the weight change on the closing step Drill. (4) Develop the Box - Explain that a simple change in placement of the 3rd step of the Side Two Step from side to forward (or back) develops the Box. Drill and mix with the Side Two Step. (5) As couples, face line of dance and march to music to form squares (Grand March) and begin the introduction to squares.

All the above can be accomplished in a very short period of time.

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## USE OF DIAGONALS

By Jay \& Boots Herrmann
Giving thought to the improvement of a R/D couple's movement, positioning and body mechanics when executing figures leads to more comfortable dancing and the couple make a more attrao tive picture.

One of the first things to consider in a dance improvement program is body position in relation of Center of Hall $(\mathrm{COH})$, Line of Dance (LOD), Reverse Line of Dance (RLOD) and the use of diagonals. When a couple is moving forward down LOD or back toward RLOD dancing flows easily. Problems arise with ease of movement on turning figures. Dancing at all levels has left and right turning figures. Left turning figures we will refer to as "Reverse" turning figures. Right turning figures we will reter to as "Natural" turning figures. In most instances, for comfortable dancing, the use of diagonals (i.e.: Line of Dance and

Center of Hall (DC), or Line of Dance and Wall (DW) are used as the starting positions for turning figures).
"Reverse" turning figures such as Left Turning Waltzes, Foxtrots, Telemarks, Double Reverses and Weaves, usually start from a position facing DC. Starting these movements facing LOD would take an additional $1 / 8$ th of a turn and make the ending position more difficult to acquire, and the turning action more forceful.
"Natural" turning figures such as Maneuvers, Right Turning Waltzes and Foxtrots, usually are started from a position facing DW. Facing LOD, again, would take an additional $1 / 8$ th of a turn.

To summarize: Use less effort in turning figures by being aware of the use of diagonals.

One further comment on making turning figures more comfortable: At our clinics we constantly remind our men dancers to "Give the ladies your arms". One of the most common faults in the execution of turning figures is the use of physical force to accomplish the turn.


Quite often a man takes his partner in the "Pivot Death Clutch" on the cue Pivot 4, or Double Reverse, etc., and attempts to physically take his lady and place her where she should go. This causes balance problems for the man and lady and makes the turning action more difficult. The lady must do her part and the man "Must Allow Her To Do lt" by easing up on the tension in the arms and clutching of the hand on the lady's back. so fellas, Give Her Your Arms...

The Open Telemark (Telemark to SCP) and the Closed Telemark (Telemark to BJO) usually begin facing DC and end facing DW. Choreographers may use different beginning and ending positions on the following figure, but DC and DW are the most common. The Open \& Closed Telemark may start in Closed Position (CP), in Sidecar Position (SCAR), and quite often in Banjo Position (BJO) after a feather in the Foxtrot. A brief description of the man's and lady's part for the Open Telemark (Telemark to SCP):

Man:(1) forward $L$ dc. (2) sd $R$ trng If arnd W \& acr lod to fc drc. (3) fwd $L$ cont If trn to end scp dw. Woman: (1) bk R dc. (2) trn If on R make most of trn with wt on Rcl L \& chg wt to L (heel turn). (3) cont If turn on L fwd R to SCP.

Note: Woman keeps head to the left on steps 1 \& 2 and turns head to SCP on 3. The Man's part of a Closed Telemark (Telemark to BJO) is quite similar to that of the Open Telemark. However, the man must realize that the woman is making more of a turn to BJO and he should be considerate with his 3rd step making it smaller to stay with the Woman. This 3rd step should be taken by the man to contrabanjo position stepping slighting outside the woman, attempting to keep the shoulders as parellel as possible. The woman's part of a Closed Telemark (Telemark to BJO) differs on the 2nd step where she makes more of a turn on her L before strongly stepping back on her $R$ to contrabanjo. The woman will keep her head to the left throughout the 3 steps.

## CHOREOGRAPHERS' WORKSHOP <br> By Brian Bassett

Numbers before and after cue words and how they affect the figures named.

Numbers "Before" the cue word denote "How Many Times" the named figure or action(s) will be executed. For example: 2 Side Closes; 2 (Fwd Sd or Bwd) Two Steps;; 2 Scissors Through;; 2 LF or RF Turning Waltzes;; In some cases the command followed with the word "Twice" is acceptable. For example: Side Close Twice; Scissors Through Twice;; Hitch Twice;; When preparing your cue sheet, however, be sure to make use of the proper abbreviations for the cue words.

Numbers "After" the cue word denote "How Many Counts" are taken "In A Row" to the "Same Number Of Musical Beats". (Hitch 4; Vine 3; Run 4;) When the cue word is preceded by "Slow" or "Walk" the number denotes "How Many Counts" are taken "In A Row" to "Every Other Musical Beat'". (Slo Vine 4;; Walk 4;;)

Note: this rule applies to "Evenly Spaced Counts". Hitch 6; does not follow the rule, but is often used in the Two Step Rhythm. Other accepted cues for this combination figure are Hitch Double, Double Hitch, Hitch Twice, Hitch Fwd \& Back or 2 Hitches. You never need say "Hitch 3;" since a hitch by definition has 3 counts in a row.
