Over 1,700 dancers, from as far north as Massachusetts and as far south as the Carolinas, showed up at Trenton State College on March 14 for the first New Jersey State Convention sponsored by the Square Dance Council of New Jersey.

From 9:30 a.m. until 11:00 p.m. the Student Recreation Center, Packer Hall and the Athletic Center were filled with happy sounds as square dancers, round dancers, cloggers, line dancers and contra dancers joined forces for a full day of activity.

The facilities at the college were perfect! The Student Recreation Center, with its parquet floor, was ideal for round dancing and clogging. During the two round dance teaches by Mary \& Pete McGee and Hap \& A.J. Wolcott the room was comfortably filled. This was also true for the instructional class in clogging. The second floor balcony was ideal for displaying the many club banners while the first floor allowed ample space for the participating club's Showcase Of Ideas... and a two-set display of Barbie and Ken dolls dressed in convention and state outfits crafted by Helen Cavanaugh.

Three Educational Seminars were held during the afternoon. The first session, based on Square Dance Programs, was instructed by CALLERLAB'S Executive Secretary, John Kaltenthaler. The second session, led by ROUNDALAB'S Executive Secretary, Peg Tirrell and based on ROUNDALAB'S Phasing System, was most enlightening to all. And the third session, a Sewing Clinic, was instructed by Rose Ericson who kept everyone "in stitches" with her sewing hints.

Packer Hall was a bee hive of activity as its North Gym hosted CALLERLAB'S

Various sessions of Advanced and Challenge dancing, along with some Clogging and Contra dancing, were programmed in the Dance Studio while Plus dancing was being held in the Athletic Recreation Center. The Progressive, Tandem and Hexagon Square sessions were all very crowded and the enthusiasm was most contagious as all the dancers realized...it worked!

All dance floors closed down at 6:30 p.m. to prepare for the Grand March which Bill Heyman promptly began at 7:00 p.m. The march was led by a committee of people who worked very hard to produce New Jersey's first convention. Committee Co-Chairmen, Bili \& Donna Anderson proudly introduced their staff of helpers and then Committee Co-Chairmen, Frank \& Helen Cavanaugh dedicated New Jersey's first convention to Convention Treasurer, George Dock, who had recently passed away. Greetings from the Governor's Office were then presented by Tony Patterson and fol-
lowed by the presentation of the Circle of Service Award, given to a dancer for his dedication and service to the total square dance activity, which was awarded to Burris \& Meryl Plummer of Pennsauken, New Jersey. On behalf of his staff and the dancers, the Chairmen thanked all of the callers, cuers and prompters who paid the full registration fee to attend the convention and then graciously donated their services for the dancing pleasure of the attendees. Finally, it was time to resume dancing. What a sight as the Athletic Recreation Center Gym suddenly became alive with motion of dancers in action.

The Athletic Recreation Center is very unique in that aside from an extremely large gym, surrounded on two sides by a balcony, there are also seven separate squash courts which served as a perfect location for the vendors to display their wares.

Many of the dancers who attended the convention arrived early in the morning and left late at night. The day was exhilerating as the attendance steadily rose

## 36TH NATIONAL CONVENTION QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

## Submitted by the 36th National Convention Committee

For 35 years, dancers have gathered to stage "The World's Greatest Square Dance Event." The 36th National Square Dance Convention will be held in Houston, June 25-27, 1987, in the Astro Hail and Astro Arena. Over 20,000 dancers are expected to attend and square up with fellow dancers from all over the world, such as Canada, Europe, Asia and, of course, the United States. A National is more than just dancing, there will be Exhibitions, a Fashion Show (also a Youth Fashion Show), Seminars, Panels and Clinics covering everything from "Sewing" to "How to Run a Club."

Below are answers to some questions
you may be wondering about regarding the 36th National Square Dance Convention.

How much does it cost to register for the Convention and what does this fee cover?

A fee of $\$ 18.00$ per delegate (in advance) or $\$ 20.00$ per delegate (after May 1st, 1987) will allow you to dance and/or attend other functions of interest from 9:00 a.m. until 1:00 a.m. during the three days of the Convention.

Where can I purchase tickets so I can attend the Convention?

You must complete a registration form and mail it along with your check to the Advance Registration Director, P.O. Box 891169, Houston, Texas 77289-1169.

When I purchased an Early Bird Certificate, did it cover my registration fee?

Yes, however, you must also complete a registration form. Make sure that your Early Bird number is written in the space provided.

Who should I contact to get a registration form for the Convention?

If registration forms are not available at the club where you dance, contact Will \& Ann DeVaney at 498-1549 or John \& Mary Pickens at 522-8387.

Will I be able to ride the bus to and from the site of the Convention and what will it cost?

Yes. Buses will be on route to and from the hotels and motels listed on the back of your registration form. The fee, which covers all three days of the Convention, is $\$ 10.00$ (in advance) or $\$ 12.00$ (at the

Are there camping facilities located on the premise and what will it cost?

One of the functions of A.S.D. Services (an arm of American Square Dance magazine) is to provide scholarships to callers desiring to further their education at callers schools. Several callers have been assisted in this way to date, but more funds are being sought for this purpose.

Individuals and organizations wishing to set aside donations in increments of $\$ 100.00$ for caller scholarships are urged to contact A.S.D. Services for full information. Several amounts already received have been designated as memorials to callers no longer with us, others are tributes to callers deserving of recognition in designated areas.

# CATEGORIES OF CALLERLAB AFFILIATION Submitted by Callerlab 

CALLERLAB has several types of membership as well as a number of ways in which non-members can become affiliated with the organization. In some instances, the difference from one category to another may be quite small. That, and the fact that the word "member" sometimes is tacked on incorrectly to the name of a non-member category, causes confusion.

To be a MEMBER of CALLERLAB, a caller must be an active caller, subscribe to the CALLERLAB Code of Ethics, pay dues, and attend the annual CALLERLAB Convention at least once every four years (eight years for overseas members). An active caller is defined as one who calls an average of at least one full dance each week and at least 50 dances each year. To qualify for membership, a caller must have been an active caller for the three most recent years. The requirement to be
an active caller is waived as a requirement for continuing full membership for those callers who have been members is good standing for eight consecutive years.
ASSOCIATES are callers who have been dues-paid members in good standing for three or more years, have attended three or more annual CALLERLAB Conventions, and who have, for one reason or another, dropped out of active calling. Upon request, this category of membership is granted to individuals whose interest and experience in caller leadership makes it advantageous to retain their expertise in CALLERLAB. Associates may not seek office or vote in elections.
A GOLD CARD HOLDER is a special category of CALLERLAB affiliation. The gold card is presented to selected individuals who have served CALLERLAB in an outstanding and meritorious fashion. The Goid Card Holder is entitiled to all privileges and benefits of active membership. To date, three Gold Card Memberships have been awarded.

THERE ARE NO OTHER CATEGORIES OF MEMBERSHIP. The category closest to that of a member is the SUBSCRIBER. This caller meets all the requirements of full membership except physical attendance at an annual CALLERLAB Convention. He or she receives CALLERLAB publications, participates in discussions and polls, and is included in the CALLERLAB insurance program. The Subscriber cannot vote in elections and can serve only on the Subscriber Committee although input from subscribers is actively solicited in straw ballots. Upon attendance at an annual CALLERLAB Convention and payment of the established dues, the Subscriber becomes a full member. This category frequently suffers from the incorrect use of the term "Subscriber Member, " which is akin to saying "Non-Member Member."
When a caller receives a nomination for membership in CALLERLAB, his or her name is entered on the roster. The candidate's qualifications are then ascertained by personal letter and, if qualified and appropriate, an invitation to attend the annual CALLERLAB Convention is issued. The name remains on that list until the caller takes action to have it removed, or other circumstances make it clear that the name should not remain on the roster. Callers in this category may become subscribers or members as established above.
At the annual CALLERLAB Convention held in Phoenix, Arizona in 1985, the members voted, almost unanimously to add a new category of CALLERLAB affiliation -- the CALLERLAB APPRENTICE. For some time there has been concern that newer, and usually younger, callers who cannot qualify for member or subscriber status do not have ready access to up-to-date information from CALLERLAB. Many of these young callers have expressed a desire to receive CALLERLAB publications and even attend the annual Convention. The wisdom of providing these future leaders with proper training and guidance is apparent and the action of the membership is in the best interest of Square Dancing.

The CALLERLAB APPRENTICE is not a member and will not be referred to as such. The CALLERLAB Apprentice may
be a caller who does not meet the requirements for membership such as calling 50 dances per year for once a week for the three most recent years. An Apprentice may attend the Conventions in a non-voting capacity upon payment of the current fees. An Apprentice gets no vote and may not serve on committees. Conversion to a full member may be requested when, and only when, ALL requirements for full membership are satisfied. If a CALLERLAB Apprentice has attended a Convention and subsequently meets our criteria for membership, the Apprentice could convert to full membership upon written application. The Apprentice would be identified with a similar but different badge from the member/ subscriber. CALLERLAB Apprentices residing in continental North America, will be covered by the same corporate liability insurance policy as are our members and subscribers.
It is hoped that with the category of CALLERLAB APPRENTICE many additional callers will be able to take advantage of the experience of the outstanding leadership available through CALLERLAB. With the opportunity of attending Conventions for Apprentices, additional training will be provided which should result in an overall improvement in the teaching and calling skills of the newer callers.
A recognized callers' organization may become an AFFILIATE organization of CALLERLAB through a chartering process. The organization need not initially have a member of CALLERLAB as one of its members. Within three years, at least one of the members of the affiliated organization must be or become a CALLERLAB member who attends an annual CALLERLAB Convention. Convention attendance requirements are then the same as for members, i.e., once in four years for organizations in North America and once in eight years for non-North American organizations. The affiliated organizations receive selected CALLERLAB publications and are expected to meet CALLERLAB standards, including subscribing to the CALLERLAB Code of Ethics. The individual members of the affiliated organization have no personal

status in CALLERLAB unless they are, in fact, CALLERLAB members, subscribers or apprentices in their own right. Members of Affiliated organizations in the U.S. and Canada who are not members, subscribers or apprentices of CALLERLAB may elect to receive liability insurance by a payment of a specified fee (currently $\$ 20.00$ per year in 1987). Affiliate organizations are eligible to receive education grants in accordance with established policies.

This explanation is intended to help our readers understand more clearly the ways in which callers can become partners with CALLERLAB and to encourage all to use proper titles when referring to the various categories of affiliation.

## TEXAS IS A CAMPER'S BONANZA

How do you like your camping? Do you bring along the TV, and shower to clean up after a stroll around the countryside? Or do you prefer throwing the tent and lantern, and maybe a cooking stove, in the trunk of the car? Whatever you like to do, Texas is ready for you. The scenery varies from the swamps and forest of the East to the rocks, cactus and spring fed poois and rivers of central Texas to the mesas, or slender table-topped mountains of the north-central part of the state. To the west, you drive and drive, through hills and stretches of plains until you arrive at Big Bend country, home of the Chisos and Davis mountains and the fabled Rio Grande River. South is 624 miles of seashore, caressing the Gulf of Mexico.

Square dancers are always interested
in history and would enjoy sitting near the very spot in Galveston where pirate Jean Lafitte buried pieces of eight. You might have to dig pretty deep, though, because after the giant hurricane of 1900, they built a seawall and raised the whole town about sixteen feet. Perhaps you are interested in the Alamo, in San Antonio. We had folks from all over come to help us in our war for independence.

Some of the more famous, and infamous, places to visit are: did you ever hear of Luckenbach, Texas (where everyone wants to go); Terlingia (home of the world's greatest chili cook-off); or Beaumont (home of the "Spindletop" museum). The biggest single attraction of North Texas (around the Dallas, Fort Worth area) is the place where J.R. Ewing is the orneriest ranch boss around. Southfork Ranch is near Plano.

The Texas Rangers are another part of Texas hisiory that you can visit at the Texas Ranger Hall of Fame in Waco. They were really a special breed of people.

Judge Roy Bean's place is all fixed up and waiting for you to visit it in Langtry. That's sixty miles west of Del Rio. You can not spend the night but you will see the place where the judge proclaimed himself, "Law west of the Pecos."

There are caves and lakes (bring the fishing rod) to visit, and museums, and some of our great vacation spots, such as New Braunfels or San Marcos. Perhaps you plan to try some sea fishing, or make a quick trip to the Mexican border or better yet, to a town further on into the interior.

## THE LANGUAGE OF SQUARE DANCE PROGRAMMING

## Submitted by Callerlab

There seems to be a great deal of variety, and some confusion, regarding the designation of dance programs throughout the square dance world. At conventions, festivals, and club dances; and in various publicity releases and publications, one sees program designations such as MS +, MS Plus, MSQS, Soft Plus, etc. What do these terms mean? Does MS + indicate that dancers should know some of the Plus Program? If so, which part? Or does it mean that, in addition to Mainstream Program dancing, there will be some sort of added attraction? The MS Plus designation is similarly
vague and confusing.
Terms such as Soft Plus really tell us nothing, since the "soft" part, like beauty, is in the eye of the beholder (or, probably, the caller for the evening). When one sees the MSQS designation, he probably assumes that the dancer will be expected to know something about Quarterly Selections. However, does that mean all Quarterly Selections, only the current Quarterly Selection, or something else? Even more important is the fact that the Quarterly Selection Program was never intended to be a regular dance program. The latest publication of the CALLERLAB basic and Mainstream Programs makes that clear with this statement: "There is no program called Mainstream Quarterly Selections Program. Those experimental calls are intended for use in Mainstream Workshops. No dancer is required to know the QS calls to attend a MS open dance. if such calis are used, the cailer is to teach them if necessary. Please advertise dance programs as MS and 'not' MSQS."

Proper program designations help dancers to find that dance where they can be most comfortable and can have greatest enjoyment. They also tell callers the program they are expected to call. We need to be more specific and careful in designating dance programs, and club officers and dancers need to be more insistent that callers adhere to the advertised program. Use of vague and incorrect programming language leads to confusion and frustration. Use of the proper terms aids both dancers and callers.

The correct program designations are shown below. Dancers should be able to dance, in accordance with their definitions, the number of basics or movements shown. All lists are current as of February 2, 1987.

Basic Program (B) - Numbers 1 through 49 on the CALLERLAB Program approved $4 / 18 / 84$.

Mainstream Program (MS) - Numbers 1 through 68 on the CALLERLAB Program approved 4/84.

Plus (+) - The Mainstream Program and the 27 calls on the CALLERLAB Plus Program approved 4/84.

Advanced One (A-1) - The Mainstream and Plus Programs and the 38 calls on
the CALLERLAB A-1 Program approved 9/85.

Advanced Two (A-2) - The Mainstream and Plus Programs plus the 78 calls on the CALLERLAB A-2 Program approved 9/85.

Basic Challenge (C-1) - The Mainstream, Plus, Advanced and the 64 calls on the CALLERLAB C-1 Program approved 11/85.

Extended Challenge (C-2) - The Mainstream, Plus, Advanced, C-1 and the 76 calls on the CALLERLAB C-2 Program approved 12/85.
