## PETTICOAT HINTS

## Ruth McLay

It's possible to add new charm to your dresses. Change the combination of your petticoats from the way you are used to wearing them. Switch them around with different dresses. Try a multi-colored petticoat or one of the new tashion colors. Or you can add a second petticoat over or under the one you usually wear with a certain dress.
Washing and Drying: When washing your petticoats treat them gentiy. ivory Snow with a very small amount of La Franz (a blueing agent) is great for white petticoats when using warm water (or water warm enough to dissolve the soap

powder). Make sure to mix your soap powder and the blueing agent very well before washing your petticoat. These two washing agents will leave your petticoat with a fresh scent after it has been dryed.

If you are washing your petticoat by hand, use an up and down motion and gently rub together any soiled area with warm water. Rinse well in cool water (not cold). You may want to rinse your petticoat several times to make sure all the soap is out.
Take the petticoat from the wash tub
and hang it dripping wet on the clothes line. Start pinning the petticoat at the waist and then at several points on the bottom of the skirt, spreading out the skirt as evenly as possible. They do dry rapidly, so switch pinning points on the clothes line and smooth out any wrinkles and then fluff petticoat.

If you are drying your petticoat indoors, protect your floor with several sheets of newspaper or plastic (or try using your garage).

If you would rather use your washer and dryer, wash in warm water using the gentle cycle and fluff dry, do not use any heat. Then hang your petticoat on the clothes line to dry the cotton area on the waist.
I prefer to hand wash my petticoats, but you may feel differently.

on. We need the full support of everybody to successfully attain the above goals.

# IT'S TIME TO GET MINI-LEGACIES ROLLING

It is well known that every undertaking must have a continuing supply of good leaders. Square dancing is no exception. ## LEGACY SPEAKS ABOUT COMMUNICATION

Legacy, through its Log and MiniLegacies, has been communicating with the square dance world for the last 15 years. Although much has been said and written about communication, lack of it has often been deemed the cause for the demise of many organizations and clubs. For most of us, the word 'communication' conjures up a vision of the spoken or written word.
Listening is another form of communication. It is listening to what others are trying to communicate to you. Listen to what spectators at a square dance exhibition are saying, "They don't look happy", or "That is for old people". If you hear this, it is telling you that something should be done to change the image we are putting forth.
Observation. How often have you, when attending another club's function, observed what is going on around you? Can you observe friction among the members or are they just one big happy family? Are you greeted with a smile or do you just have the sign-up sheet shoved at you? Take your observations back to your club as a way of improving its image.

Body language is another form of communication. All of us have attended square dance functions where people are seen hugging each other as they renew friendships. Hugging tells people that you like them and are glad they are your friends and members of your square dance family.
Legacy members hope that everyone will concentrate on listening, observing and hugging so that we may impart an entirely new image to the general public and members of our activity.

## 3RD NEW JERSEY STATE CONVENTION DATE CHANGED ...NO FOOLING!

The Square Dance Council of New Jersey has announced that the date of the 3rd New Jersey State Square \& Round Dance Convention has been changed from March 11, 1989 to April 1, 1989 at Trenton State College in Ewing Township.

Doc \& Peg Tirrell, Chairmen of the Square Dance Council of New Jersey, and Tex \& Margaret Shipman, General Chairmen of the 1989 Convention, explained that changes in availability of facilities at the college resulted in the Council rescheduling this successful event, which attracted 1,925 participants in 1988.

Over 400 dancers have already registered for the 1989 Convention. They will receive individual notification of this change from the Registrars and may request refunds if necessary. ## Choreography Instructions...

(Starting from Right or Left handed Box Circulate foursomes.) After any call that ends in a Box Circulate foursome, the trailing dancers pull by with the outside hand. Ending formation is Back to Back Couples. Examples are: Touch A Quarter \& Cross, Split Circulate \& Cross, and Scoot Back \& Cross. (Timing is not specified.)

## Choreography Examples...

(Starting from a Static Square.) Heads Right \& Left Thru, Heads Touch A Quarter \& Cross, Pass \& Roll, Split Circulate \& Cross, Step \& Slide, Horseshoe Turn,

Pass \& Roll Your Neighbor, Trade The Wave, Right \& Left Grand.
(Singing Call Figure.) Heads Touch A Quarter \& Cross, Pass \& Roll Your Neighbor \& Spread, Quarter Thru, Scoot Back, Boys Run, Slide Thru, Square Thru Three Quarters, Swing Your Corner, Promenade.
