Inspired by the 30th Convention Committee's success, the 31st Committee is off and running with a pre-registration of over 500 dancers. Although they have a hard act to follow, they are confident they will rise to the occasion.

Keep September 17-19, 1992 blocked out on your calendar for the 500th Birthday Party of "America and You in ' 92 '" at the Cherry Hill Hyatt.

Remember, there is one more prize we can all collect and that is the great time we will have at the 31st Delaware Valley Square \& Round Dance Convention.

## 17,840 DANCERS ATTEND THE 40TH NATIONAL

Birmingham, Alabama, in 1995 was announced as a future National Convention site as 17,840 , including dancers from all 50 states and many foreign countries, attended the 40th National Square Dance Convention in Salt Lake City, Utah. Thirty-nine states had 50 or more dancers in Salt Lake City and 34 had 100 or more -- making it a truly "National" Convention. Also, 322 came from 10 foreign countries.

Future Convention dates are: Cincin-nati-June 24-27, 1992; St. Louis - June 23-26, 1993; Portland - June 22-25, 1994; and Birmingham - June 21-24, 1995. Conventions always start on the Wednesday before the fourth Thursday, and last four days -- they are awarded four years in advance.

The 1996 Convention will be awarded in Cincinnati during the 1992 Convention at a Public Bid Session at 9:00 a.m. on June 26, in the Cincinnati Riverfront Coliseum where all interested cities will present their bids.

Future General Chairmen include: 1992- Wayne \& Miriam Florea; 1993 Robert \& Karen Fleher; 1994 - Don \& Shirley White; and 1995 - John \& Dimple Williford.

Due to the illness of previously-elected Lee \& Lettie Reed, Ernie \& Barbara

Stone will serve another term as presidents. Other officers for 1991-92 are A.R. Rodgers, vice president; Glenn \& Lois Baldwin, secretaries; and Carl \& Jean McCarver, treasurers. Howard \& Peggy Thornton will continue as Directors of Information.

The 17,840 at Salt Lake City included 3,274 from California; 2,461 from Utah; 1,044 from Colorado; 853 from Texas; and 648 from Missouri.

The 43 members of the National Executive Committee will hold their PreConvention meeting including future Chairmen in St. Louis, March 10-15, 1992. The official kick-oft dance will be held on March 14.

Floyd \& Claire Lively will begin their eighth consecutive year as editors and publishers of the convention sponsored "National Squares" quarterly magazine which is available for $\$ 4.00$ per year by writing to 6768 S. East St., Apt. 2, Indianapolis, IN 46227. It has a world-wide circulation in the interest of the National Convention.

## SOME CONVENTION HISTORY

The Delaware Valley Federation of Square and Round Dancers held its 31st Annual Convention last year. It was a large and gala affair.

In the Fall of 1959 local caller Buck Fish was serving on the staff at an out of state Federation dance. This dance was an eye-opener for Buck. Dancers and callers whom Buck discussed the huge success of the dance with seemed to agree that the reason its outstanding success was its sponsorship by the Federation.

Buck began asking a lot of questions and gathering all the information he could, even a copy of the Federation's By-Laws. He was so inspired that he desired to help create a Federation back home in order to bring dancers together to have a super gala dance like the one
in which he had just taken part.
Buck began to develop a plan on how to proceed. He realized that it would be a problem to have a State Federation in this geographic area, where along with Philadelphia and its suburbs there are large portions of Delaware and New Jersey. So the most sensible approach appeared to be a Federation of the Delaware Valley.

The Dance Leaders of Delaware Valley accepted Buck's plan and gave him the necessary support. He promoted his ideas and requested that leaders from each club attend a meeting for the purpose of organizing such a Federation.

A meeting was held at Mac's Barn in Kulpsville, PA on July 17, 1960. Approximately 60 people attended. Clubs represented were: Delco Squares, Rancho Squares, Herschler's Barn, Shooting Stars, X-B, Lower Saucon, Dudes and Dames, Carousels, Cross-trailers, Country Squires, Oaklyn Haylofters, Merry-Go-Rounders, Piney Holler Squares, Delaware Valley Round Dancers, Newtown Squares, Grand Squares, Jolly Promenaders, Wagonwheel Squares, Swap and Swing, Dudes and Dolls, Belles and Beaus, Park Promenaders, Keystone Jiggers, Buckaroos and Squarenaders.

Buck detailed his plans as follows... The organization was to be made up of square and round dancers only. No professional callers would be eligible for membership. According to Buck, time has proven this to be a good policy.

Buck's last official act was to appoint the Chairman and Vice Chairman of the organization. Following this, several meetings were held to elect officers and plan for the first Federation dance which was held at the Bellevue-Stratford Hotel in Phildelphia.

After celebrating the 31st anniversary of the Federation and its Convention, the success of the Delaware Valley Federation and Convention speak for themselves.

Next time you see Buck \& Edie Fish, let them know that you saw this article and acknowledge their efforts.

## RUTHIE'S SEWING BASKET

by Ruth McLay

I trust by now all your holidays were pleasant and enjoyable, and you are looking forward to a brand new year.

Let's talk about one kind of belt that may be different to you... the String Tie Belt.

When making this belt, remember the width depends on the waistline measurements of the wearer. Narrower belts are more flattering for most figures.

1) Cut the fabric three inches wide, plus seam allowance, and as long as you desire to make an attractive length for tieing.
2) Select the proper interfacing if needed, for the type of material used. Cut the interfacing only half as wide as the belt. If "sew in" type is used, stitch the interfacing on the outside edge (lengthwise along the fold line of the belt material).
3) Fold the belt lengthwise, right sides
together. Pin, baste and stitch. Leave a four inch space unstitched near one end.
4) Turn the belt and work out the seams so they are even. Close the four inch opening by slip stitching. Then press carefully.

See, it's so easy. So why not give it a try.
