## RUTHIE'S SEWING BASKET

Hopefully this will be the beginning of nicer weather, with a new start for everything and everyone. Conventions and vacations being planned... New life with the green grass and beautiful flowers... Picnics and trips here and there... Plenty of dancers around to enjoy no matter where you go to explore... (Please excuse me, but I seem to get carried away.)

Getting back on the subject of sewing, perhaps you would like to try the following suggestions concerning your dance apparel.

When making a bell sleeve, try using a contrasting liner. Cut the liner and material for the sleeve. Put the right sides of the liner and material together and sew across the bottom of the sleeve, then join them together at the underarm seam. Turn the two pieces right side out and press. Then ease into the armhole of the bodice avoiding stretching either piece and sew sleeve into the bodice.

You make make a reversible vest for your partner out of these two materials or from any two of your favorite dress materials.

Do have a good vacation and look for square dances everywhere you may travel. Have fun!

## DIXIE DERBY'S NEW BEGINNER'S CLASS

Dixie Derby's new class, which begins next September, will take part in a revamped program that is very unique for the Delaware Valley, and to a large part of the rest of the United States. This program will extend the teaching of Basics and Mainstream to 11 months and include the teaching of APD/DBD concepts. No Plus will be taught during the first year. Class will run uninterrupted (except for normal school breaks) from September through the end of July. Students will then return in September for a second year in which Plus and Plus APD/DBD will be taught. The second year will also extend 11 months.

The result of this program will be, we hope, the finest new graduates ever to enter the square dance world in the Delaware Valley. Similar concepts in a different format have been used by individual callers in other parts of the United States and Canada. Dave Lightly (lowa) and Ann Uebelacher (Canada)
have both experimented with the teaching of APD/DBD to new students. In Scandinavia, students are required to dance Mainstream for two years before they are allowed to progress to Plus. (They are among the finest dancers in the world.)

Our presentation will be made to our own Federation, seeking to use their influence to persuade all clubs to follow Dixie Derby's lead. Letters from club President Bill Johnson and "Dance!" magazine will also be presented to John Lachenmayer, Eastern Vice President of the United Square Dancers of America, who will then in turn take them to the Callerlab Convention coming up this spring. It is important that Callerlab be aware of what we are doing. It is equally important that we attempt to persuade them to work toward adopting this program universally.

We truly believe that there is room for all levels of dancing in our country, from the Community Dance Program for those with a casual interest in dancing to our version of the Basic Program, designed to produce dancers who will be able to dance for the shear enjoyment of being able to maintain continuity in a square and finish a tip without the constant frustration of breaking down and not knowing how to continue.

## GREATER CINCINNATI PLACES OF WORSHIP; RICH IN HISTORY AND TRADITION

If you've ever wanted to see the famed Notre Dame Cathedral, you don't need to travel to Paris to see a church just like it. When you are in Cincinnati for the 41st National, take time off to cross the Ohio River to Covington, Kentucky. There you will find the Cathedral Basilica of the Assumption, a small-scale replica of the famous Paris church, complete with gargoyles, flying buttresses and the largest stained glass window in the world.

Greater Cincinnati's large number of historic places of worship is a result of the religious interest and devotion of its settlers. A number of these places have been placed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Some of the more famous places of worship in the downtown Cincinnati area include:

Covenant First Presbyterian Church at 8th and Elm Streets. This church, built in 1875, is known as the oldest Presbyterian Church north of the Ohio River.

Plum Street Temple at 8th and Plum Streets. Opened in 1866, the temple was constructed under the leadership of Isaac Mayer Wise, founder of the Jewish Reform movement. This magnificent Moorish/Spanish style temple is now
used only on special occasions but tours are available.

St. Peter in Chains Cathedral at 8th and Plum Streets. This truly inspiring edifice is considered one of the most handsome and monumental examples of Greek Revival architecture in the United States.

Christ Episcopal Church at 318 Fourth Street. Located in the heart of downtown. Christ Church was organized by Dr. Daniel Drake, founder of the first medical college west of the Alleghany Mountains.

Other downtown churc hes include St. Xavier Church-Jesuit at 607 Sycamore Street, St. Louis Church at 29 East Eighth Street and Union Baptist Church at 405 West Seventh Street.

If you want to visit a place of worship during your stay in Greater Cincinnati, the Convention's Hospitality Committee will be happy to help you find the place of your choice.

## A VIEW FROM THE FLOOR

Perhaps you have executed the call "Wheel Through". If so, you know that the couples that have the action part of the call begins with clapping hands as soon as they hear the call while proceeding to complete the call. Perhaps you have also heard the caller say... "I hear a lot of clapping, but not much is happening."

That little scenario helps to set the stage for what I am about to share with you. We have been hearing a lot of talk, but not much is happening.

Most square dance leaders are extremely concerned about the losses we have been experiencing in square dancing activities. As a result of this ! have attempted to put together a plan to help. This plan has to do with saving three old line clubs that are in trouble and are trying to pull themselves up and keep going. This plan is probably nothing new, but it's something new to us and it is a concept to try. Something to get us off the dime. Something to get our club members stimulated and hopefully
excited about. Let's say that it's better to try something than to just wait and hope. Wait and hope won't get the job done. Perhaps this plan may be the thing that you as a club member can use in whole or in part to help spark your club.

Armed with a plan and enough material to make an appeal, I contacted "club contacts" John \& Kathy Falter of Perky Promenaders and Aaron Silverstein of R \& R Squares. As we talked, both John and Aaron agreed to join me as "principals" in this endeavor. Two delegates were then selected from each club and a meeting was set to take place.

The purpose of this association is:

1) To get the three clubs to work together and to allow each club to become better acquainted.
2) To combine talents, knowledge, abilities, skills and resources to be applied to a common cause.
3) To develop fresh and innovative ideas, concepts and approaches which will ultimately lead to each club prospering with an increase in participating membership, increased attendance at dances with a quality dance program to attract the square dance community at large.

At the first meeting, ideas and comments were brought forward and a name was chosen for the organization - the "Try-Tri Association".

Delegates in attendance were: Lentz's Lofters - George \& Sophia Kraynak and Marian \& Paul Bisbing; Perky Promenaders - John \& Mary Ellen Lachenmayer and Doug \& Jeanne Vollmer; and R \& R Squares - Dick \& Ceil Smith and Ed \& Rosemary Lagan.

Club members were encouraged to visit the other clubs as groups and their first dance was free if they wore their club badges and colors. The purpose of this was to foster friendship among the three clubs.

Plans are now being made for a "TryTri Association" picnic. Sub committees
are being formed and will be meeting to bring in proposals for consideration of having Association Dinner Dances and a "Gala Dance" which would be a major effort on behalf of each club in the Association.

The focal point of a "Gala Dance" is to get interaction between the three clubs, to open lines of communication, as well as having a three clubs working and planning together for a common effort.

Lentz's Lofters dances on the first, third and fifth Fridays. R \& R Squares dances on alternate Fridays, the second and fourth, while Perky Promenaders dances on the first and third Wednesdays. All three clubs use Peg \& Joe Dockry as their round dance leaders and they are all within a geographical boundary that does not infringe on any other club's territory. Each club has been in existence for a number of years and has enjoyed the benefits that are normally associated with old line clubs. They have also established quali-

## THE I.O.K. CAMPGROUND

The hosts of the I.O.K. Campground in Cleves, Ohio welcome the 41st Na tional Convention to the Cincinnati area and are committed to making our ex-
perience enjoyable. The facility has been in operation for 20 years and covers 64 acres of fenced, private, shaded and grassy open camp sites. The campground is only open to special groups such as ours and will be available beginning June 21, 1992, for early arrivals.

For our safety, the I.O.K. Campground will man a message center on a 24 -hour basis. Along with an emergency phone for incoming calls, there is access to a CB base unit for those who have a CB in their camper. Pay phones for outgoing calls are just outside the message center. The grounds are completely fenced in with a single entry check point, and there will be a 24 -hour vehicle patrol of the grounds. Security lighting illuminates the roads and grounds. In the case of emergencies, numerous fire departments, ambulance, life squads, and paramedic units are located nearby.

This campground does not have hookups, so it is designed for self-contained motor homes. There is safe drinking water throughout the grounds and 30 , private-stall, warm-water showers are located at the headquarters building. There are also flush toilets at this building, and portable units will be placed throughout the grounds. Arrangements can be made to have your holding tanks cleaned for a fee. Filling of water tanks at your site will require you to provide long garden hoses. You may wish to bring small tables and lawn chairs since these items are not provided at each campsite.

The campground is easily accessible from 1-275 and only 20 minutes from downtown Cincinnati. Shuttle busses will pick up dancers at areas located within comfortable walking distance from your campsites. Within one-mile of the grounds you can find churches, a grocery store, pharmacy, beauty shop, video rental, restaurants, hardware store, laundromat and gas stations.

The main room - 4,175 sq. ft. - located at the headquarters, has room for a planned dance or other social activities. There will be full kitchen facilities where snack toods and limited menu items will be sold during posted times. The campground will also sell firewood and ice. A large, outdoor patio is available for re-
laxation.
Also available to you is a State approved RV dump station at the entrance of the campground. Garbage pickup will be provided each morning at your site.
